Mission- There was first a discussion about what an Arts Council could be and why have one.

There is agreement that Washington has quite a few assets in regards to the arts and any Arts Council should represent a cross section of all the arts. The old mission was to create events and promote economic activity. A broader mission was discussed. Dan suggested we lay out a plan and the more specific it is the better.

The draft Mission statement was shared and has been attached with the proposed edits.

Everyone shared ideas regarding possible topics for the council with some specific ideas.

- 2. <u>Collaboration-</u> working with the schools to let them know "we are here!", improving communication within the Town, sharing space needs, studio and performance, cross promoting and shared marketing
- 3. <u>Marketing-</u> Getting our name out there in Litchfield County and beyond. Promotions with tie-ins with businesses, i.e. wear your Pilobolus shirt and get a discount at a restaurant. Bringing tourists to town.

Marketing for our Washington organizations that are performing outside of town as well as organizations from out of town performing here e.g. Shakesperience, Litchfield Jazz.

- 4. <u>Artists</u>- There was a discussion about what we can do to support artists, resident and guest. Housing came up as an issue. It is challenging to house guest artists as well as expensive for artists themselves to live here.
- 5. <u>Next meeting</u>- It was agreed we should meet in a month and was suggested everyone share what they have coming up for the summer. Question- Does being part of a Local Arts Council open up larger grant opportunities?
